 - Permission to write messy, crooked, imperfect sentences.
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STEP 7 — Edit (Round 1): Shape the Clay

“You’re not fixing. You’re sculpting.”

- What to focus on in the first pass: clarity, flow, and heart.
 - How to read your story like a friendly stranger.
 - Gentle questions to ask yourself as you revise.
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STEP 8 — Edit (Round 2): Polish the Edges

“Now we tidy up—like sweeping the cabin floor.”

- Strengthening sentences, trimming tangles.
 - Checking pacing, transitions, and emotional resonance.
 - How to keep your voice intact while refining the work.
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STEP 9 — Edit (Round 3): Shine Without Over-Shining

- Final pass: grammar, consistency, and readability.
 - How to know when your story is “done enough.”
 - A playful checklist to keep perfectionism in check.
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
